Cafeteria Prices

There were no increases made in the cafeteria prices this year. Students in grades K through 6 will pay \$2.35 for lunch and .50 cents for extra milk. (This is the only change this year by lowering the 6th grade price.) Students in grades 7 through 12 will pay \$ 2.60 for lunch and .50 cents for extra milk. Ala Carte items can be purchased for \$1.50. Adult lunches are \$3.40 and .60 for extra milk. Deposits to the students lunch accounts can be made prior to the start of school in each office. During the school year, Middle and High School students are asked to drop off any payments at the office and not in the serving line.

Free and Reduced Lunches

Families that qualify for free or reduced

lunches may fill out the necessary papers to get their children a free, warm lunch daily, or at a reduced price of .40 cents. Papers will be sent home the first day of school with the youngest in the family. Please return the paperwork quickly to the school office and we can confirm eligibility and put the child immediately on the program.



District Financial Report

These definitions are provided to help you better understand the Income and Expense Statement below. This statement is for the General Fund only, so it does not include, for example, revenue and expenditures for the Bond Retirement, Permanent Improvement, Student Activity and Athletic Funds. The Kalida Board of Education and Administration are committed to financial responsibility and accountability. We welcome your feedback on this information. Income

Real Estate Taxes - These are the property taxes paid by our district landowners, both residential and commercial.

Public Utility Personal Property Taxes – This money is paid by utility and telecommunication companies on the value of their stations, towers, poles, etc. This is not to be confused with Tangible Personal Property Taxes that businesses use to pay on the value of their inventory and machinery. That tax was eliminated in 2009 by the State of Ohio and replaced with a C.A.T. tax and Kalida Schools does not receive any C.A.T. tax money.

Income Tax - Kalida School District has a 1% continuing school district income tax. This tax is paid by district residents on their income.

Misc. Local Revenue – This includes student supplemental reading material sales, recorder sales and library fines, donations to the general fund, copies and laminating fees, sale of equipment, etc.

School Foundation – This is revenue from the State of Ohio that is designated for the general operation of our school district. Driving factors for this money is the number of students we serve and value of our district real estate property.

Homestead & Rollback – Each property taxpayer received a 12.5% reduction on their property tax bill for their primary residence. The state reimburses school districts for this reduction.

Misc. State Revenue - Misc. State grants are included on this line.

Expenses

Salaries – This expense is the salaries of all employees, including substitutes, severance payments, and misc. income. This report is for the general fund only, so does not included employees paid out of other funds, such as the cafeteria workers who are paid out of cafeteria funds.

Misc. Benefits - This line includes life and vision insurance expenses, contributions to employees Flex and HSA plans, and unemployment, workers compensation, and medicare tax payments

Misc. Purchase Services – This expense includes all services we receive from our internet provider, costs for our students being educated in other districts, property, fleet and liability insurance and all other utilities not broken out.

Supplies and Textbooks – This expense is for all supplies for the district. This includes instructional supplies and textbooks, as well as diesel fuel and tires for the busses and other consumable items such as paper, janitorial supplies, etc.

Equipment – This expense is mostly for new computers and other technology equipment and new busses since both of these funds are within the general fund. Other equipment expenses are paid for out of the Permanent Improvement Fund.

Miscellaneous Expenses – This includes fees paid to our county auditor's office for collecting property taxes, fees paid to the state for collecting our income taxes, financial audit fees, and legal advice for board policies.

Cash Advances – Funds that are advanced to another fund from the general fund, but are paid back to the general fund when the other fund has the funds available.

Transfers – This line records funds that are permanently transferred from the general fund to another fund.


