
Cats Who Care Poinsettia Sale Returns!

How You Can Help Your Child?

Speech and language development play a significant role in a child's early success in school. It impacts their reading and writing development. Yet, there has been an increase in the number of speech referrals across the state, in the county and here in Kalida. While we are addressing this need, it's important to note there are some things parents/grandparents/care givers can do to help our youngsters develop good, solid speech. Speech is not only articulation (saying the sounds correctly), it also includes vocabulary (word meaning and word use).

Learn from peers - socialization

Exposure to good spoken language is definitely a key to speech and language development. Through meaningful conversations with peers and adults, children thrive. Adding more adjectives in your daily speech is an easy way to enhance good spoken language. Children not only learn from adults; they may learn even more from their peers. This is why early socialization is so important. Continue those play dates, social visits with friends that include your children, time spent with extended family, and story time at the library, etc.

Exposure to good spoken language

Meaningful conversations with peers and adults are necessary in speech and language development. Reading books, singing songs, repeating rhymes (Mother Goose poems) and visiting the local library are ways to provide children with good spoken language. Playing with, talking with, and talking about what you are doing as you do it (cooking, driving, grocery shopping with a toddler in the cart, playing a game, etc.) are a few more ways to expose children to good spoken language. Using and emphasizing concept words (positions, locations, etc.) enhance a child's ability to follow directions. For example, "I need to put the sugar IN the bowl", "We are turning LEFT", "We are BESIDE the school", "Take the game OUT of the cabinet", etc.

Limiting the amount of screen time

While youngsters can grasp some language from the screen, they do not learn language near as well, nor as fast as they do when having meaningful, interactive conservations. Less than 1 hour of screen time per day is beneficial. This includes: TV, iPads, cell phones, etc. While screen time is an easy babysitter, and children seem quite entertained, it is much more important they be involved in interactive play, creative play (Legos, Play-Doh, house, dress up, etc.), games, hands-on activities, etc. When you can, involve your child in the task you are doing. Talk about what you are doing.

Spending time conversing with your child, providing socialization situations and limiting screen time are important ways to help our young children develop solid speech and language skills. ~ *Elementary Principal Kathy Verhoff*
