

## New Chromebooks at Kalida

A Chromebook is a computing device that Google and hardware manufacturers created to provide affordable access to the internet. This device competes with iPads, Android Tablets, Windows Tablets and most notebooks. What makes the Chromebook less expensive is that it's basically the Chrome web browser running on a smaller set of hardware. The Chromebook is not as powerful as a Laptop, but it doesn't really have to be to be an effective internet device.

The reason Kalida, and other local schools, recently purchased new Chromebooks was two fold. With more mandated online testing, the Chromebooks were a simple and cost effective way to allow us to test many more students at the same time without tying up our current computer labs and classroom computers. This reduces the amount of days students are testing and are not receiving instruction and allows teachers to still use the buildings' computer labs while the testing is taking place elsewhere. This decision to add to our portable devices will provide even more technology for students to use for projects, homework and testing during the regular school year.

The initial purchase of Chromebooks is a cart of 32 each; one cart for the high school and one cart for the elementary school, for a total of 64 devices. Also, we chose to add four Chromebooks in the three kindergarten rooms to replace the end of life kindergarten classroom computers.

# 844-SaferOH – Introducing Ohio's new school safety tip line

Law enforcement officers and education leaders have combined efforts to establish a new confidential **SaferOH** tip line. The resource gives students, parents, teachers and administrators a way to anonymously report student



safety threats to school officials and law enforcement officers – whether they involve a potential incident of mass violence, a suicide threat or the bullying of a single student.

Research shows that in 81 percent of violent incidents in U.S. schools, someone other than the attacker knew something but didn't report for fear of being identified. This free service is available to any Ohio public or private school.

Kalida Local Schools is already registered and able to serve our community 24 hours a day, whenever a student or concerned adult senses a threat to student safety. The call center guarantees the anonymity of the person who calls or texts. Tip line workers may ask for additional information, but the one who calls or texts may remain anonymous or leave contact information for follow-up.

Trained professionals at Ohio Homeland Security's Threat Assessment and Prevention unit answer calls and texts to 844-SaferOH. When action is needed, staff immediately forward information to the school staff member we designate. Local law enforcement agencies or others may be notified if the situation warrants. Tip line staffers will follow up quickly with the affected school and law enforcement agencies to make sure the incident was investigated and the outcome was tracked.

**Post-secondary/Dual Enrollment/AP Meetings Scheduled**—On February 11 at 6:30 PM there will be a meeting in the auditeria for the parents of high school students who may be interested in taking a college level course during next school year. There are two options at Kalida High School for students to take college level courses. One option is the College Credit Plus Program in which students can take college level courses while in high school. These courses are either taught by a college instructor or members of our KHS staff who have been approved by a local college to teach respective courses. Finally, college credit can be earned by scoring a high enough score on AP exams which are administered at the conclusion of AP courses in May. Various AP courses are offered at Kalida High School. A representative from James A. Rhodes State College will be present to explain the College Credit Plus program and answer questions. The following courses at Kalida High School are high school courses which can be taken for college credit from Rhodes State College or Wright State University: Psychology, Computer Applications, Introduction to Engineering, Principles of Engineering, Digital Electronics and AP Biology. Thus, it is important for parents of students planning to take any of these courses for college credit attend the meeting at 6:30. If parents have attended this session in previous years, then there is no need to attend again.

**AP Course Sessions**—There will be meetings on Wednesday, February 11 at Kalida High School for students and parents of the students who will be taking any advanced placement (AP) courses next year. These are courses which can also earn students college credit upon completion of the AP exams. AP courses offered at Kalida include the following with the grade level required for participation in parenthesis: American History (10, 11, 12), Government (12), Biology (11 or 12), and English (12). For convenience, these meetings will begin at approximately 7:15 PM and will follow the above mentioned PSEOP/Dual Enrollment session since many parents may need to attend both. 
