## Notes from the Superintendent

As we enter the month of November, it is a very exciting time for the Kalida School District. Within a two month time period we will have opened the new 7-12 facility, completely automated our cafeteria payment system, and gone online with an automated grade book system that allows for full parent access.

**Moving In** - Students and Staff members are scheduled to move in to the new facility after Thanksgiving on Monday, November 28. Hopefully there will be no further delays. The building is about 95% complete and we are expecting an occupancy permit to be issued on Friday, October 28. Girls' Basketball practice officially begins on Monday, October 31 and the team is tentatively scheduled to begin practicing in the new gymnasium on November 1. If the volleyball team is still competing in tournament play, hopefully they will have the opportunity to practice in the new facility as well. The upcoming fall play is scheduled to be held in the new auditoria on November 11 and 12.

**Open House** - Two Open House dates have been scheduled on Sunday, November 6 from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M. and during Parent-Teacher Conferences on Monday, November 21 from 5:00 P.M. until 9:00 P.M. Please mark one or both of these dates on your calendar so that you can take a look at the new building.

**Progress Book** -All parents of 7-12 students should have received a password for Progress Book access in the mail last week. To date, over 100 parents have already logged in to check on their children's grade information. This software will make it easier for parents to access student information and provide a very convenient method for communication with teachers. Kalida was chosen as a school to pilot the software and thus far our experience has been positive. Please keep in mind that the complete changeover to Progress Book is not scheduled to take place until semester break.

**Future Construction** -A meeting was held on September 30 with the Ohio School Facilities Commission regarding funding for future construction. Kalida has moved significantly closer to being funded for Phase II which includes the completion of the new high school building as well as construction of a new Kalida Elementary. The OSFC has begun conducting environmental assessments and updating enrollment projections in preparation for Kalida to receive future funding. I will keep you updated on the Phase II timeline as more information is received. Our timeline is heavily dependent on what happens in the November and May elections for the districts that are ahead of Kalida on the eligibility list.

**Five-Year Forecast** -The Kalida Local School District's most recent 5 Year Forecast is now available to view on the school's webpage. Click on Administration and then School Finance Information.

**Parent-Teacher Conferences** - On Monday, Nov. 21, and Tuesday, Nov. 22, our school buildings will have extended hours to allow parents to discuss the progress of their children with the teachers involved. On Monday, the conferences will begin at 5 pm and end at 9:00 pm. The daytime conferences on Tuesday run from 11 am to 4 pm, and then resume after a dinner break and run from 5 pm to 9 pm. Sign-up sheets will be posted in the school buildings the first week in November.

Classes on Monday Nov. 21 will follow the regular schedule. There will be NO SCHOOL for students on Tuesday or Wednesday, Nov. 22 and 23. Students will return to class on Monday, Nov. 28.

During the conferences, parents of high school students can take advantage of sessions on **ProgressBook**, the new software program that allows parents to monitor student progress through the Internet. Mr. Stober will offer these sessions in the new building. Signs will be posted in both high school buildings to give more specific directions during the conferences.

**8<sup>th</sup>-Graders to visit Vantage** - On Thursday, Nov. 10 our 8<sup>th</sup> grade students will leave after lunch to visit Vantage Career Center. They will visit all program areas at Vantage, and will have a chance for a “hands-on” experience in about half of them. This is a good opportunity to see what training areas are available at Vantage and to allow them to think over some of their future career options. This will also help them during the winter as they make plans for their high school coursework.

**Financial Planning Day** - Members of the KHS Class of 2006 were the guests of Superior Federal Credit Union for an all-day financial education event at the Lima Civic Center on Wednesday, Oct. 26. Students attended sessions concerning college finances and investments. They also participated in a “Reality Day” organized by Nancy Recker from the Ohio State University Extension in Allen County. For this event, students drew careers out of a hat (as well as a family!) and planned their spending based on the salary given for that career. They had to circulate through a number of booths and make spending decisions about utilities, transportation, housing, food, and child care, etc. Their expenses piled up quickly and many of them found out that there just wasn’t enough money to cover their needs! Nearly 400 students participated in this wonderful program. We were lucky to be asked to participate in this event.

**Career Day** - KHS Juniors will travel to the OSU and Rhodes campus on Friday Dec. 9 for a Career Day hosted by the two colleges. They will each have a chance to hear three presentations from the 58 career areas that will be featured that day. There are also some general sessions on choosing a major, choosing a college, and surviving in college. Students will leave KHS after their 1<sup>st</sup> period classes and will return after eating lunch in the Eastgate area. We are grateful to Rhodes and OSU for the great deal of work that goes in to coordinating this event.

**College timelines** - Just a reminder to parents of college-bound seniors. This is a review of information that has been provided before, but it should be helpful to print once again. This year’s seniors were told last spring to try to have their college applications well underway by Halloween, and definitely finished by Thanksgiving. Christmas break is NOT a very good time to work on applications because many of the schools that our students consistently choose have important deadlines in early December. After New Year’s Day, parents can start working on the FAFSA which is due between Valentine’s Day and March 1 (each college is different—be sure you know the deadline for your school). Around St. Patrick’s Day students should receive an “award” letter or financial aid package from the schools they applied to. By April 15, students should finalize their decision about which college they plan to attend. The last holiday in the sequence is Memorial Day—the time for graduation and well-earned celebration!

**Applying for college online** - I encourage students to apply online to the colleges. They need to start the college experience in this mode as so much of the communication they will have with the college will be electronic. I’m happy to do paper applications for students as it’s a little easier to handle the counselor part of the process with a paper application. However, I believe it is still in the student’s best interest to apply electronically and to continue to communicate electronically. The downside of all of this is that parents are left out of the loop when college information comes that traditionally would have come through the mail. That’s a little scary for parents, but the students have to take responsibility for themselves. This has come about as a result of privacy laws that prevent colleges and universities from sharing a lot of the information about a student’s records once the student has officially enrolled. (This is true even when Mom and Dad are paying the bills—go figure!) Therefore, beginning this process now while parents and teachers are still available to answer questions or to provide gentle reminders seems to be the best way to handle the transition of responsibility that comes as a student leaves high school and enters college.

**Scholarship Information** - Go to the high school website (<http://kalida.k12.oh.us>) and click on the link to the guidance department. Then scroll down until you begin the three-column portion of the page. There you will see the first box is labeled Scholarship Opportunities. There are two links in that box. The first is for scholarship information that has been received so far and the second lists last year’s scholarship information so that students and parents have an idea what information may be coming in the future. This site is updated as warranted when new information is received. At this time of year, most scholarship programs are university-based—scholarships that students can read about as they apply that are based on grades or talent in specific areas. Scholarship applications that are sponsored by clubs and organizations generally don’t start arriving until the holidays or after. Students should also be checking out scholarship sites such as FastWeb at this time, as more and more organizations are bypassing the expense of mailing to schools and posting their scholarships directly on the internet. FastWeb is a legitimate scholarship site that can be trusted but turn down the special offers that you will see as you log in. Another helpful site, sponsored by college financial aid officials, is [finaid.org](http://finaid.org). Links to both of these sites are also provided on the page mentioned previously.

Students are notified when the scholarship page is updated and will also hear on the daily announcements as local scholarships become available. We do keep a list of students who pick up applications for non-Internet scholarships, as well as those who actually complete and return them. An updated printout of scholarships will be available at parent conferences.
